WHAT ACE HAVE DONE

The ACE team continue to work with partners and policing taking actions on a daily basis to restrict and reduce the theft of agricultural and construction equipment. A summary of actions are shown below:

Arrests



Assisted more than 10 arrests



Arrests made as a result of ACE intelligence have resulted in sentencing of organised criminals and a reduction of crimes

Recoveries



Co-ordinated more than 20 recoveries



Total value of recoveries coordinated by ACE in excess of £500,000

International Co-operation



Engagement with foreign law enforcement



Made more than 100 stolen property reports to foreign law enforcement during 2022 resulting in recoveries of stolen items

Co-ordination



Co-ordination between policing and industry



ACE attend meetings with policing and partners to ensure police are prepared for current threats and industry are offered guidance around emerging methods of crime

WHAT ACE HAVE DONE - RECENT EXAMPLES



In January 2022 a GPS thief was arrested as a result of an ACE notice. £50,000 of stolen items were recovered and the suspect was sentenced for these crimes. As a result of this action, **0 GPS** thefts were recorded for a sustained period.

In April 2022, ACE intelligence led UK police to intercept criminals travelling to export stolen plant machinery. 3 individuals were arrested and an organised crime group disrupted.

Recoveries



In June 2022, £80,000 of laser scanning equipment was recovered from Heathrow airport preventing export to Cairo.

In March 2022, response officers stopped a suspicious vehicle after an ACE alert and recovered a stolen mini excavator.

ACE have worked successfully with industry partners on a number of occasions to coordinate police attendance when stolen machines have been recovered.

PLANT MACHINERY THEFT

Trend

 Theft of non road registered machinery has increased by 26% during 2022 compared with 2021 (January - June) as crimes have now reached pre-COVID volumes. It is expected that crimes will continue to rise as a result of the ongoing issues with demand.


Methods

 Criminals are continuing to target smaller machinery and specialist equipment which is easier to move after theft. It is likely that overall plant crime has increased more than known as it is difficult to measure theft of equipment.





- When any emerging trends are identified ACE will continue to share awareness documents and co-ordinate police response through forums and guidance.
- ACE will continue to ensure an effective response through forums, guidance and collaborative working.








Excavator Theft



FUEL THEFT

Trend

- There has been a 30% increase in fuel theft during 2022 compared with 2021 (January-May) following the legislation change in April 2022 and increasing fuel prices.
- Thieves have been targeting fuel from storage tanks, construction machinery and HGV's.
- Thieves are known to use IBC tanks to assist in the removal of the fuel.



Action

- Police across the UK have taken decisive action including arrests relating to a group involved in more than £1m of fuel theft.
- Opal are members of the newly formed national Fuel Theft Working Group where we will discuss and review police response to fuel theft.



Response

- Opal are working collaboratively to develop a fuel theft problem profile.
- Opal are also working with industry partners to understand the full scale of the crime.

TOOL THEFT

Trend

 Tool theft has been a long term problem. Criminals are targeting high value tools which can be easily re-sold within the UK and internationally using various online platforms. Tools frequently targeted include angle grinders, electric drills and electric saws.



- ACE are working with the National Business Crime Centre to tackle
 tool theft and are reviewing a number of areas including: police
 response, prevention techniques and crime recording.
- We are also working with industry partners to explore security measures which could be implemented to reduce criminality.



- ACE encourage all owners to mark tools both overtly and covertly as well as removing tools from work vans and storing in a secure location when not in use.
- ACE are also working with partners to develop and promote marking options such as Micro CESAR.





TRAILER THEFT

Trend

- Trailer thefts have been high throughout 2022. Offences reached a record high in January 2022 and have increased 69% compared with 2021 (January-June).
- Agricultural trailers including horse boxes and other livestock trailers have been targeted with Ifor Williams being the prominently stolen make of trailer.



Action

- The ACE unit have raised the issue of trailer theft with policing in national bulletins. The increased profile of this crime type as raised by ACE has been instrumental in achieving a **number of arrests**.
- ACE encourage all owners to **report any suspicious incidents to police** as this crime is often preceded by a site visit or unusual activity.



Response

- ACE recently hosted a policing forum where we identified methods used in criminality nationally, (including the use of drones by criminals to identify target trailers) and shared best practice.
- Multi- layered security is the best way to deter theft of trailers. Owners should consider the security of the site, CCTV, forensic marking, installing trackers and also overt marking.



EMERGING TRENDS

Theft of Survey Equipment

There has been a recent increase in targeting of specialist construction equipment which is likely to continue. This includes theft of survey equipment and GPS equipment from construction sites. Demand for these items is increasing and it is likely that criminals will continue to diversify into this area.



Theft of Fuel

The increase in cost of living and fuel prices are likely to drive a further increase in fuel theft. New crime groups are likely to enter the space with new methods as the commodity becomes more desirable. Latest trends have seen offenders siphon fuel from construction machinery. ACE will continue to monitor emerging trends and share relevant advice. Opal are members of a Fuel Theft Working Group to discuss a police response.



High Demand

The high demand for construction items due to supply issues combined with the current cost of living increase may encourage new criminals to enter this crime area. ACE will continue to monitor emerging trends and raise with policing and industry where required. It is likely that any specialist parts in high demand or any parts that increase in value will be targeted.


